Interview Notes: 4784

Donor 4784 is one of the most lovable people I have met. With an infectious smile, he exudes happiness and warmth. He came to our interview wearing baggy blue jeans, a striped t-shirt under a grey windbreaker and DC shoes. His oversized baseball hat sat backwards over his long, shoulder-length black hair, and the iconic white headphones trailed down to his pocket. He wore frameless rectangular glasses and had a light goatee and a little black fuzz over his lip. Apparently, this is the only facial hair he is able to grow. The donor does resemble Steve Aoki (as he says in his Personal Questionnaire), but a much younger, much sweeter, smiling version of the DJ.

4784 immediately launched into his complex life story. Born in Japan, he was the first son in his family. His mother's father owned several restaurants and had arranged the marriage. Having a son is fortuitous in Japan, so when he was born, donor 4784 was spoiled rotten. His mother had two more boys before the couple divorced. She packed up her children and left for the States without telling anyone. She remarried and had a fourth son.

Having come from a well-off household in Japan, where he was favored and spoiled, 4784's new lifestyle (considerably less affluent) was difficult and confusing for him. He spent most of his time at school or with friends. It was helpful that he was popular. At 16, donor 4784 convinced his mother to allow him to graduate from high school early. His plan was to take cooking classes and start an apprenticeship as a sous chef at a Japanese restaurant. He soon found that cooking at a restaurant was vastly different than cooking at home. The hours and stress associated with a busy restaurant were too much for a 16-year-old, and he found himself working 10-12 hours, 6 days a week. As a result of the work hours, stress, and an aversion to spending his free time at home, donor 4784 found himself hanging out with a rough crowd. After a run-in with the law, he spent a year in Juvenile Hall. Instead of moving back home when he was released, he moved into a youth homeamove that changed his life for the better.

In his youth home, donor 4784 found the support and encouragement he needed. His supervisor instilled a sense of security in him, and served as a great male role model in his life. His therapist helped him find his voice and understand what it feels like to feel truly *heard*. These two influential people made donor 4784 realize that he wasn't cut out for the restaurant business. Reassessing his goals, 4784 now wants to earn a PhD in Psychology so that he can help others in some of the same ways that his therapist and supervisor helped him.

Donor 4784 feels very connected to the Identity-Release Program because after moving to the United States he grew up knowing almost nothing about his biological father. His mother's departure from her arranged marriage cut ties with his biological father completely. Recently, donor 4784 began asking his mother questions about his father, and she has declined to give him much information. He made a point of telling me how much it would mean to him to be able to give offspring the opportunity to have information about him if they seek it. Donor 4784 has an indomitable spirit and uncrushable optimism. He not only affected me with his joyfulness, our staff feels the same way about him. I've rarely seen anyone so enthusiastic and genuine about life. Although his story is at times troubling, it's easy to imagine all the good that donor 4784 may accomplish when he finally reaches his goal of working with youth. This was easily one of my most enjoyable interviews.

I believe I am a good person and strive for excellence.

What are your interests and talents?

I think the human mind is fascinating. I can usually read people very well. This is one of the reasons I picked Psychology as my major. I also like to play and watch sports but especially love to play baseball. I am a very good cook and worked as an apprentice for a couple years under a Japanese chef. I found it was not the same as cooking at home, but I still cook most of my meals myself at home. I love to read all types of books, both fiction and nonfiction. I listen to all kinds of music, anything that makes me want to move my head. I like to watch movies and tv shows of all genres except horror.

What are some of your goals and ambitions in life? Where do you see yourself in 5 or 10 years?

I want to get a degree and receive my Ph.D. in Psychology. I want to help kids in the juvenile halls realize they have more potential than what everybody tells them. They need someone to show them that they can actually succeed in academics and being physical is not the only way they can be strong. I hope to one day be in the Psychology books with my own theories and maybe even discover a universal, effective parental curriculum. In 10 years, I hope to have a house and be on the way or already have my own family. I want to have two kids, one boy and one girl. I am not sure where I will be living, but hopefully by then, I would have traveled around inside and outside the country to find the best place to create a life.

How would you describe your skills and interests in the following areas?

Math: I am very good at math. It was my best subject in school, but I never liked it. I always thought it was boring.

Mechanical: I do not know much about cars or engines, but I am good at fixing things. I grew up in homes that were very old, and I would figure out how to fix the things that broke when I could.

Athletic: I played many sports growing up, but I loved baseball. I was always one of the top players in each of the leagues I was in. My main position was a pitcher, and I would play second base when I wasn't pitching. I was once MVP when I was 13 in my little league, and played in high school.

Musical, Artistic, Creative: This is one of the few talents I wished I had. I played trumpet in middle school and can sing fairly well, but I cannot draw. I am a creative person, but I cannot draw anything I see on paper.

Language (what languages besides English do you speak?): I am learning ASL and was once fluent in Japanese. I forgot Japanese when I was younger because my mom stopped speaking Japanese to me when I moved to the US when I was three. I am going to re-teach myself hopefully this summer.

Writing: I am a fairly good writer. I know my grammar well, but my vocabulary is not very big.

Literature: I am not good with poems, but I am a fast reader. I can usually finish a novel in a couple days if I am not too busy.

Science: Math and science have always been my strong suit. It was easy, but I never enjoyed it.

The above family medical history information has been self-reported by the donor. We work with each donor to obtain as complete and accurate information as possible, but we are unable to completely rule out the existence of other health information that is not known, or that remains unreported to us.

As a board certified genetic counselor, I have reviewed this donor's family medical history for identifiable patterns of inheritance that may place the donor or his biological offspring at increased risk for certain health problems. ("Increased risk" is risk that is greater than the risk in the general population).

Both maternal grandparents apparently have a history of alcohol abuse. The factors contributing to this issue are complex, and likely include environmental, personal, cultural and possibly hereditary influences. Upon review of the available family medical history information from this donor, the risk for similar health problems occurring in offspring is not expected to exceed the risk in the general population.
