INTERVIEW NOTES: 5726

Donor 5726 arrived to the interview wearing a brown, knitted sweater over a pink and blue striped button up shirt. He had dark blue jeans on with semiformal brown shoes. His face was nicely framed by a close cut beard and moustache that matched his full head of wavy salt and peppered hair. Donor 5726 has full lips, one pierced ear, and an olive skin tone. He somewhat resembles Michael Peña, but with more pronounced dimples when smiling.

Donor 5726 grew up in Northern California primarily with his mother and two older sisters. He has another older sister and a younger brother who he did not live with while growing up. He and his sisters got along (and still do), and enjoyed playing with Legos, climbing trees, watching TV, and playing Nintendo. As a child Donor 5726 enjoyed school and loved learning new information. He had a particular affinity toward language, and appreciated how words sounded and felt in the mouth and how they could be used to create stories. He also liked reading a lot, in particular Where the Sidewalk Ends and The Giving Tree. With friends, Donor 5726 spent time listening to music, reading comic books, and collecting action figures.

During middle and high school, Donor 5726 liked watching movies and hanging out at the mall with his friends. He became involved in Latinx and Indigenous cultural clubs as well as theater. While he had fun performing in school plays, he got more out of the Chicano community theater that he also participated in. Donor 5726 recalled how great it felt to be with people who were similar to himself. They did mostly sketch comedy and political satire, which was fun and challenging for him. Donor 5726 is still involved in theater, but with elementary age children. He hopes to one day create a cultural center as well.

As high school progressed, Donor 5726 still spent a lot of time reading, but no longer found school challenging and became bored. On the verge of dropping out his senior year to work on hotrods, his English teacher pulled him aside to encourage him to graduate. Donor 5726 went on to graduate before spending five years working and enrolled in junior college. During this time he became somewhat unchallenged and bored once again. He decided to enroll in a four year university and earned a Bachelor's degree in theater, focusing on social justice. A couple years after graduation, Donor 5726 went on to graduate school to earn a Master's degree in creative writing. He especially enjoyed *focusing on his craft and being around like-minded people* during this time.

For work, studies, and family Donor 5726 has traveled to several US states and Puerto Rico, as well as France, Italy, Mexico, and Peru. He found Peru to be *magical* and could see himself living in Mexico City one day. He also traveled to the UK for his work doing creative writing with prisoners, which he has been doing for at least 10 years.

Donor 5726 is currently a dean specializing in student engagement and social justice; and he is very close to finishing the manuscript for a book he has been writing. He has two young children who he enjoys cooking for with farmer's market fresh ingredients. Donor 5726 feels like he is a combination of his mother, who is *fierce* and *protective*, and his father, who is *laid back* and *doesn't take things personally*. Ultimately, he describes himself as an introvert who, as a performer, can tap into his extrovert side. In the next 10 years, he aspires to publish at least two books, own a home, settle into a career possibly outside of academia, find an amazing partner, and maybe have one more child.

Donor 5726 is clearly a very interesting and highly motivated person, who we are excited to have in our program.

My motto for relating to others is to meet them where they're at and not where I might ideally want them to be.

Poetry and the written word fascinate me. I do write, I am a poet. The focus of my written work strikes a balance between personal narrative and social commentary.

I'm a teacher too, at heart. I mostly teach at the university level and in jails and prisons. The work that I've done in prisons has allowed me to travel internationally to prisons in other countries.

Nature feeds my spirit and I try to get out to the ocean or forest a few times a month. My radio dial stays steadily on the jazz station.

What are some of your goals and ambitions in life? Where do you see yourself in 5 or 10 years?

Some of my goals for the next 5 years include publishing a book or two of poetry and traveling the California coast by train. I find riding the train to be a soothing and joyous experience.

In 10 years' homeownership is definitely the goal.

How would you describe your skills and interests in the following areas?

Math: Basic. I did well through geometry and struggled with Algebra II.

Mechanical: It is difficult for me to hold many pieces of a thing mentally and think about their corresponding function and interaction. But can track the process from beginning to end, piece by piece.

Athletic: I have recently returned to strength training at the gym after many years of sitting for extended period of time. In high school I played four years of football as an offensive lineman.

Musical, Artistic, Creative: Love to listen to music, but not much skill in this realm.

Language (what languages besides English do you speak?): Spanish

Writing: Love to write. I have been published and had my work recognized publically by a U.S. Poet Laureate.

Literature: Funny, I love to write. But am a poor reader. I can read and comprehend very well. But have a hard time finishing a book. Could read across a broad range of genres and subjects. As reported to me, there does not appear to be personal medical health history that would confer an increased risk beyond the general population risk.
