INTERVIEW NOTES: 5819

Donor 5819 came to our interview casually dressed in a crisp white t-shirt, black slacks, and blue jacket. He has straight, thick dark brown hair brushed back from his head. He has straight full eyebrows that accentuate his beautiful brown eyes and a fair, rosy, slightly olive complexion which reflects his biracial heritage. Donor 5819 is half Chinese, Irish and English. He has a beautiful smile and a straight nose proportional to his face. He resembles a young version of the actor, Johnny Bosch.

Donor 5819 grew up in Northern California with his parents and two brothers. He and his brother were kept active with sports, theater, and choir. He said he was a very active kid and *got banged up a lot* riding bikes, hiking, and playing with his brothers.

Donor 5819 attended a private K-8 school with 40 students in the entire school. He enjoyed school but had no "favorite" subjects. He also played basketball and ran track at school. After school you could usually find him playing video games or playing with remote control cars.

Donor 5819 enrolled in the largest public high school in his district and said it was a *shocking transition* (which we can only imagine!). He said that playing sports helped him acclimate to such a change. He also had a circle of friends from childhood that he continued to hang out with. Donor 5819 played football and ran track in high school. He had a challenging school schedule taking advanced placement english and literature classes. Most of his time was filled with sports and studying but he did find the time to learn how to play guitar.

He earned a football scholarship at his local college and then went on to earn his B.A. in Managerial Economics after transferring to a larger university. Managerial economics focuses on applied economics; he studied lower-income countries and the geo-considerations of economies based on agricultural endeavors. We found this a fascinating way to look at finance: with an eye for helping countries with much smaller economies than the U.S. While at university, he played football for a year and was a student resident firefighter for a year. He obviously loves to give back to his community and to the world. He has recently begun volunteering with a literacy charity.

He has always been interested in how finance works and now works as a supply chain consultant, which he says is *challenging but rewarding*. He plans to go to graduate school in the next three years and hopefully be the director of a company a few years after that. He also sees himself settling down and having a family of his own.

He likes to cook dishes with seafood like ceviche. When asked if he cooks for his friends, his answer was a resounding "no" but he did admit he cooks for his girlfriend. Nowadays, you can find him taking photos, painting, working out, and playing golf. He still hangs out with his friends from high school and enjoys a good comedy.

Donor 5819 loves to travel and has been to Hong Kong at least ten times! He has also visited Malaysia and various European nations, starting as a child exploring the world with his family. Colombia and Cuba are on his bucket list.

GENETIC SCREENING RESULTS:

Genetic screening tests can significantly reduce, but never completely eliminate, the chance that a person is a carrier for a particular disorder.

Expanded carrier screening for 268 autosomal recessive conditions was completed by Invitae and reported on 03/19/2022.

The results were **POSITIVE** for **SLC26A4-related conditions**. Donor 5819 is a carrier for these conditions. **It is strongly recommended that recipients who use this donor's sperm undergo carrier screening for these specific conditions.**

Testing was negative for the remainder of genes screened.

I have adopted the mantra to always ask why, or better yet, why not? It is always better to look back and have a story to tell than be left wondering what if; because smooth seas never made a good sailor. I was part of a very

rigorous process to become a student resident firefighter in college, played football, joined a fraternity, transferred colleges, changed jobs, had a few heartbreaks and made many other non-traditional moves in a search for the best experience. It is my personal belief that one should never settle in all aspects of life. I enjoy attacking each day with a passion and taking everything as it comes to me.

The above family medical history has been self-reported by the donor. We work with each donor to obtain as complete and accurate information as possible, but we are unable to completely rule out the existence of other health information that is not known, or that remains unreported to us.

As a board certified genetic counselor, I have reviewed this donor's family medical history for identifiable patterns of inheritance that may place the donor or his biological offspring at increased risk for certain health problems. ("Increased risk" is risk that is greater than the risk in the general population). As reported, DIS 5819's family history is remarkable for clubfoot. Clubfoot is a multifactorial condition that affects males more frequently than females. The chance for a first degree relative to also be affected with clubfoot is about 2%. This risk is much lower for offspring of DIS 5819 (who are second degree relatives) but could be higher than the general population risk, which is about 1 in 1000.
