INTERVIEW NOTES: 4703

Donor 4703 is a tall, handsome, well spoken, intelligent man. I really enjoyed meeting and talking to him. He came to our interview wearing fitted dark grey chords, a denim button-up shirt with the long sleeves rolled neatly to his elbows, and brown loafers. He has beautiful medium brown skin and a clear, smooth complexion. He has a striking resemblance to a young, slightly lighter-skinned, Laurence Fishburne with subtler facial features and smooth skin. I think it is but would more accurately be described as the better looking younger brother. He has a physique more like Damon Wayans Jr—tall and physically fit. He has a perfect afro that was neatly pulled back by a navy blue jersey-knit headband with every hair piece of hair perfectly in place. Like most donors, he was a little shy at the beginning of our interview and I was pleased when he opened up once he got comfortable.

Donor 4703 is originally from North Carolina and later moved to Maryland near the DC border. He told me that he loved the DC-metropolitan area and *just felt better once he drove over the state line.* He just moved to the Bay Area after landing a prestigious internship immediately after graduating from college. He told me he is enjoying his time in California and is trying to experience all that it has to offer. For example he participated in the *Bay to Breakers* and had a blast saying that yes, other places he has lived in have had fun festivities, *but nothing quite as weird*. Being in an entirely new state has been an adjustment and even though he misses his friends from school and family at home he is busy branching out and meeting people and forming a new home base here. 4703 intends on visiting his family a couple times a year and talks to them at least once a week. Both of his parents were constantly working throughout his upbringing and even still 4703 found moments to always go to his dad for advice. The donor has one younger sister. He described himself as a typical protective older brother... *until she turned 15.* When I asked if he backed off because she was becoming embarrassed by his protective ways, he laughed and explained *No, we just got to that age where for me girls were just annoying and unbearable to be around*.

Donor 4703 is so personable and easy-going that I was surprised when he described himself as a loner during high school. He explained that he transferred from a private, all-boys Catholic school to a public school for his junior year. He told me the experience was almost like a movie—he went from a straight-edge school with little diversity that required a suit and tie, to a large place *filled with different groups of people, people smoking cigarettes outside class, and people making out in the hallways*. After he settled in he still remained on the *outskirts with a small group of friends*. He told me he is grateful for the experience and is a better man for it *because he was surrounded by diversity and he learned to love meeting new people*.

Donor 4703 is passionate about film and a lot of our conversation surrounded television shows, screen adaptations of books, and soundtracks. He told me he likes to read the books which had horrible film adaptations so he can compare and see what went wrong. In the donor's free time, he enjoys browsing film catalogs and checking out new independent films. I could see him get into the zone when describing how a soundtrack can make or break a film because it *really sets the pace and tone of the film*. His favorite soundtrack is from "Soul Food" because he vividly remembers borrowing it from his dad's collection when he was 8 or 9 and listening to it over and over again. He told me his path to film studies was a process. He started college as a Political Science major and immediately changed to Economics, which he kept as his major until the middle of his sophomore year. He got a job in the industry and though the money was good, he saw too many people going home unhappy and unfulfilled. When he re-grouped to figure out his future, he was determined to study something that he was passionate about- so he decided to follow his dream of being a sales agent of independent films – an ideal job with a lot of travel. His family has been completely supportive of his career choice.

A few random fun facts about donor 4703 is that his favorite holiday is Christmas, his favorite type of food is Chinese food, and he one day hopes to be a proud owner of a pot-belly pig that he will name Wellington. When asked if he is a cat or a dog person, he said he is both. He explained he owned dogs throughout his childhood and actually used to hate cats until he decided to get one a few years ago (his apartment had a no-pet policy, so he figured a cat would be easier to hide). Donor 4703 was a real pleasure to get to know; he is so thoughtful, intelligent, and easy on the eyes. I came out of the interview with a huge smile on my face, as well as a list of movies to watch and books to read.

The above family medical history information has been self-reported by the donor. We work with each donor to obtain as complete and accurate information as possible, but we are unable to completely rule out the existence of other health information that is not known, or that remains unreported to us.

As a board certified genetic counselor, I have reviewed this donor's family medical history for identifiable patterns of inheritance that may place the donor or his biological offspring at increased risk for certain health problems. ("Increased risk" is risk that is greater than the risk in the general population).

This donor has a large family and has provided good information on his relatives' health problems. Upon review of the available family medical history information from this donor, the risk for most health problems that he has reported is not expected to be higher than the risk in the general population. This is because a number of the most significant health issues appear to be strongly influenced by lifestyle factors such as smoking, obesity. One exception is high blood pressure, which has an increased incidence in the general African-American population, and when identified early is often easily treated.
