INTERVIEW NOTES: 6216

A warm smile greeted us as we entered Donor 6216's interview. He was dressed in a blue long-sleeved Polo shirt, grey pants, and black shoes. His black hair was cut close to his head while his dark thick eyebrows framed his medium brown eyes. Donor 6216 has a proportional nose for his symmetrical face and a rounded chin.

Donor 6216 was born in Mongolia. His parents divorced when he was roughly two and a half years old. This caused him to move from Mongolia to the mainland, specifically, Shanghai, China. He moved in with his father's parents, while his parents moved away for work. His grandparents were educated and spoke English, which exposed Donor 6216 to the language early in life. He is bilingual, speaking Mandarin and English. As a kid, Donor 6216's favorite sport to play was soccer. He remembers playing with his friends and other children in his neighborhood and still finds time to play now. He shared that he attempted basketball and boxing, but he just didn't take to it like he had with soccer. For a few summers, his dad took him to swimming lessons which he also enjoyed. The summers were when his mother would come to visit him at his grandparents', while he would see his dad on the weekends year-round.

In school, Donor 6216's favorite subject was math, especially geometry. He told us how he enjoyed math classes up until high school when it became much more difficult. Another subject he enjoyed learning about was history. His least favorite subject was reading. He found himself to be better at listening and observing than reading when it came to learning. When he was in high school, Donor 6216's mother moved to the US. Soon after, she asked him if he wanted to move to the States and live with her and he agreed. He attended four different high schools, due to his mom's career as a banker causing them to move frequently.

Donor 6216 was taught how to play the piano when he was young and also the violin for a short time. In his free time, he likes to watch movies, futuristic genres are his favorite. The first American film that he watched was The Titanic, which he said he loved. He enjoyed the Harry Potter and Star Wars films as well. Donor 6216 was taught how to hunt by a friend while on a camping trip. He told us that during hunting season, he and his friend have helped ranchers by hunting foxes and pigs who ruin the pumpkin harvest. He noted that wild animal overpopulation can be detrimental to the environment and hunting was a way to ensure environmental protection.

After high school, Donor 6216 worked a series of part-time jobs and fell in love with working with children diagnosed with autism spectrum disorder. He helps mentor the students, assists with schoolwork, and coaches them in basketball. He works with a range of ages from young children to teenagers and said he loves working with his students and seeing the younger ones build up their confidence and self-esteem over their time spent together.

Donor 6216 recently came back from a 7-month, 30-country trip, that he said was mostly unplanned. He would travel to a destination, stay for a few days, then book a ticket to the next country. A couple of his favorite stops were Sapporo, Japan, the Maldives, and St. Petersburg, Russia. Though he's not a huge fan

of cooking, his go-to is steak with arugula, and is learning how to BBQ. He is very active, and though he no longer has time for boxing, he still enjoys jump rope and various other cardiovascular exercises.

Donor 6216 has partnered with a friend to run a wholesale e-commerce business. He has purchased two homes, one in another state he currently rents out, and another currently under construction. He hopes to rent them both out for additional income. His goal in the next 10 years is to be able to run his own e-commerce business, create a source of residual income while having both homes as passive income, and settle down himself.

Donor 6216 told us that his friends at work would describe him as punctual, a great listener, and uplifting in the workplace. His closest friends would say he's loving, goofy, and fun to be around. During his interview, we were able to see how true these qualities rang, and we are excited to have him on our catalog.

GENETIC SCREENING RESULTS

Genetic screening tests can significantly reduce, but never completely eliminate, the chance that a person is a carrier for a particular disorder.

Expanded carrier screening for 525 autosomal recessive conditions was completed by Invitae and reported on 11/06/2023. The results were **POSITIVE** for **Zellweger spectrum disorder (PEX1-related)**. Donor is a carrier for this condition.

It is strongly recommended that recipients who use this donor's sperm undergo carrier screening for this specific condition.

Testing was negative for the remainder of genes screened.

CONCLUSION

The above family medical history information has been self-reported by the donor. We work with each donor to obtain as complete and accurate information as possible, but we are unable to completely rule out the existence of other health information that is not known, or that remains unreported to us. The donor reports he has limited contact with the paternal side of the family, therefore he may not be aware of additional health conditions present. As a board certified genetic counselor, I have reviewed this donor's family medical history for identifiable patterns of inheritance that may place the donor or his biological offspring at increased risk for certain health problems. ("Increased risk" is risk that is greater than the risk in the general population). As reported to me, there does not appear to be personal medical health history that would confer an increased risk beyond what is seen in the general population.

Benign lung nodule: non-cancerous lung nodules are common, and often develop as a response to an injury or wound. They are rarely related to inherited conditions. The risk to offspring to also be affected with lung nodules is likely at or near the general population risk.
